

FOCUSING ON SECULAR SANCTITY

Join us Aug. 10–12 to "Celebrate Secular Saints" at our Annual Regional Gathering — a time of sharing and participating.

2007 is the eighth centenary of the birth of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, the patroness of the Third Order Regular and the Secular Franciscan Order. We plan to focus our time together on secular saints, St. Elizabeth, and examples of apostolates.

We gather at LifeWay Ridgecrest Conference Center, just minutes from Asheville, N.C. Meal and room prices are less than last year.

Reservations will be made to the BSSF Region (your minister/leader has the reservation forms) instead of the facility by July 10. However, you will pay Ridgecrest when you check in.

For those staying at Ridgecrest, the fee includes your room for

two nights, plus five meals (Friday-night dinner; Saturday breakfast, lunch, and dinner; and Sunday breakfast).


If commuting, you'll check in and pay the day fee plus the cost of the meals you want. When you pay, you'll receive your meal ticket. Meals are served buffet style.

Alcohol — other than sacramental wine — is not allowed on the premises.

Minister's Message

Dear Franciscan Family,

My service to you as minister in the past three years has had some challenges, but the rewards have been more numerous. It has broadened my visions of this "way of life" and inspired me by the witness of our members.

Our growth is a sure sign of hope for the future of Secular Franciscans in this region, our country, and our world.

Have you ever been asked the questions: What is the Secular Franciscan Order? Who are Secular Franciscans? What do they do?

The answers to those questions are in our Rule and General Constitutions. Take time to step back and reflect on who you are and what you are called to do.

The Secular Franciscan Order is a public association in the Church. It is divided into fraternities at various levels: local, regional, national, and international. Each one has its own juridical personality within the Church (Gen. Const., art. 1.5).

St. Francis of Assisi founded the SFO, along with the First Order and Second Orders. We are all called to continue the mission that God gave Francis to repair his Church.

The vocation to the SFO is a vocation to live the Gospel in fraternal communion. For this purpose, the members of the SFO gather in ecclesial communities which are called fraternities (Gen. Const., art. 3.3).

A member of the SFO is a member of the local, regional, national, and international fraternities. Entering the SFO and making perpetual profession is a commitment that impacts and embraces our entire life.

Mindful that the Holy Spirit is the source of their vocation and the animator of fraternal life and mission, Secular Franciscans should seek to imitate the faithfulness of Francis to His inspiration. They should listen to the exhortation of the Saint to desire above all things "the Spirit of God at work within them" (Gen. Const., art. 11).

Gaining inspiration from the example and the writings of Francis and, above all, filled with the grace of the Holy Spirit, each day the brothers and sisters faithfully live the great gift which Christ has given: the revelation of the Father. They should bear witness to this faith before all:

- o in their family life,
- o in their work,
- o in their joys and sufferings,
- o in their associations with all men and women, brothers and sisters of the same Father,
- o in their presence and participation in the life of society,
- o in their fraternal relationships with all creatures (Gen. Const., art. 12.1).

Emanuela De Nunzio, former SFO minister general, wrote in February 2001: "It rests on each one of us to ensure that we are 'spirit and life,' an instrument of consolidation and growth See MINISTER, page 3

of our order. We also, Secular Franciscans, are called to be witnesses, that is to say, martyrs for Christ."

Perhaps we will not be asked to give witness by shedding our blood, but we will certainly be asked to give witness by being coherent and firm in the fulfillment of our baptismal promises, renewed and reaffirmed through profession in the SFO.

Our profession, the Rule, and its application — the General Constitutions — are, for each of us, the reference points for daily experience, beginning with a specific vocation and precise identity.

On this basis we need to reshape our existence and find a project of life (Franciscan evangelical radicalism) and a place of Church communion (the fraternity), in which it should be possible for us to "learn the purpose and the way of living, loving, and suffering" (Gen. Const, art. 10).

St. Francis said that he did what was his to do, and we are called to do what is ours to do: "For up to now we have just begun."

"When you were just a baby ..."

Does your child ever ask what happened the day she was born, how Mom and Dad met, or about other family events from the past?

Take the time to tell her all the details. New

research shows that the more a child learns about her family—and her place in it—the greater her sense of self-confidence and competence.

We all are, or have been, "baby" Franciscans—new to the family — and I agree that the more we know about our family the more self-confident and competent we are.

There are many ways to do this.

We can, for instance, learn about Franciscan saints, blesseds, and venerables during ongoing formation in our local fraternities and in our larger fraternity: our Brothers and Sisters of St. Francis Region. Last year, our ARG focused on St. Clare; this year, we'll look at St. Elizabeth of Hungary.

At the memorial service at the ARG this year, we're including a Litany of Franciscan Saints of the First, Second, and Third orders. You'll find a "Litany of Franciscan Saints" in the *Secular Franciscan Companion*, as well as similar litanies online. Pick some names and find out more about those people.

The Franciscan supplement to the Liturgy of the Hours offers brief biographies of some of our Franciscan ancestors in faith.

That supplement sometimes gives you a different perspective than what's in the "Proper of Saints" in the LOH. For example, on Feb. 6 in the LOH "Proper of Saints" we find the memorial of "St. Paul Miki and Companions, Martyrs," who died in Japan in 1597. Paul Miki, a Jesuit priest, is stressed because he was Japanese and these are the "Japanese martyrs."

supplement, it's the memorial of "Peter Baptist, Paul Miki and Companions, Martyrs." The supplement states that most of these martyrs were Franciscans, including 15 Seculars.

In the ongoing formation that we do on our own, over and above what we prepare for formation in our fraternity meetings, we can also get acquainted with Franciscan family members. The Office of Readings, for example, includes a biblical and nonbiblical reading. For the nonbiblical readings, why not use the writings of Francis, Clare, Bonaventure, Angelo of Foligno, Thomas of Celano, the *Little Flowers of St. Francis*, just to name a few.

Saints, though, aren't just those on the "official" list. We all know First, Second, and Third Order Franciscans who, by the way they live their lives, exemplify what it means to be Franciscan.

Hearing from them in their own words can be as inspiring as reading about Franciscans of past times.

At this year's ARG, we plan to recognize those members of our region who've been professed for significant periods of time. It'll probably add up to hundreds of years of profession.

We can also learn the stories of our own fraternities: When and where was the fraternity established? What significant events have happened? What have been the fun things, and the sad times, that build the life of any fraternity family?

The course for fraternity spiritual assistants was originally called "Life-Giving Union." Now, it's called "Franciscan Family Connections." This is a good name for this course, but it also reminds us of our family history: the history from the past and the history we are continuously creating.

Carol Paul Pavur, SFO, the NFG's chosen leader, has been recognized for 25 years of profession.

At the Area 1 Retreat, June 1–3 at Dubose Conference Center, Monteagle, Tenn., Carol renewed his profession promises during Sunday Mass, which Fr. Linus DeSantis, OFM Conv., celebrated. Carol made his perpetual profession on May 16, 1982.

Channel of Peace Fraternity, which is sponsoring Sts. Francis and Clare NFG, gave Carol a Franciscan Crown that Channel of Peace member Barbara Garrison had made.

"I was completely surprised and was overwhelmed with the goodness and thoughtfulness of the Secular Franciscans," Carol said later. "I didn't expect [the recognition]. I was professed at St Bonaventure Monastery in Detroit where Father Solanus Casey is buried."

On another note, when Sts. Francis and Clare NFG celebrated the profession of Sharon Bubel and Janette Irwin at St. Mary Church, Oak Ridge, Tenn., July 1, it proved to be even more special than they had anticipated.

Faye Martin, SFO, Channel of Peace Fraternity's minister, reports that Jesuit Father William Oruko, the NFG's spiritual assistant, "was as excited as the newly professed. He had a sign out in front of the church stating the Franciscans were having a profession [that] day. He also arranged for a group at the church to prepare our lunch."

Pope asks for a solution in Darfur



Pope Benedict XVI has asked for a negotiated solution to the bloody situation in the Darfur region of Sudan.

"In this deadly conflict, that primarily affects the civil populations, everyone knows that no solution to arrive at a just peace can be implemented with the force of arms," the pope said, June 1, after receiving the letters of credence of Ahmed Hamid Elfaki Hamid, the new ambassador to the Holy See from Sudan.

The pontiff spoke of the need for "a culture of dialogue and negotiation, so as to arrive to a political solution of the conflict, which respects the cultural, ethnic and religious minorities."

Benedict XVI continued: "It is never too late to courageously make the necessary, and at times demanding, decisions to bring to an end a crisis situation, with the condition that all parties involve themselves with sincerity and with determination in their resolve."

The Holy Father made a call "to all persons that have responsibility in this situation so that they continue their efforts and make the required decisions."

Secular Franciscans across our country have continued to send prayers for peace.

All members of the Brothers and Sisters of St. Francis Region are asked to pray for nine days, beginning Aug. 12.

Please, let us raise our voices in the following prayer for those suffering and those causing the suffering.

Please place in our hearts that same love and inspire us to have the courage, wisdom, and ingenuity to take what measures we can personally to relieve the suffering in Darfur. Memorare: Remember, O most gracious Virgin Mary, that never was it known that anyone who fled to thy protection, implored thy help, or sought thy intercession was left unaided. Inspired by this confidence, I fly unto thee, O Virgin of Virgins, my Mother. To thee do I come, before thee I stand, sinful and sorrowful. O Mother of the Word Incarnate, despise not my petitions, but in thy mercy hear and answer me. Amen **T**

Franciscan Action Network: What's it all about?

Dear brothers and sisters,

As representative for the BSSF Region at the historical meeting in March, I bring you the latest update on our efforts to advocate as "one voice" on behalf of the marginalized, poor, and those affected by violence and threats to the environment.

What is the FAN?

Inspired by the lives of St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi and the long heritage of men and women who follow in their footsteps as present-day disciples of Jesus Christ, the Franciscan Action Network (FAN) is designed to bring a coordinated and effective voice to matters of justice, peace, and care for creation in our world.

FAN's advocacy focus is the U.S. government and related Washington, D.C.- based institutions, such as the World Bank, International Monetary Fund, and Organization of American States. Advocacy topics will be international and domestic. In these arenas, FAN hopes to bring a spirit of healing and reconciliation as it advocates world transformation, as inspired by God's Spirit.

Who is the FAN?

The strength of any network dedicated to social transformation is the people and institutions that comprise it. FAN is made up of recognized U.S.-based Franciscan entities (with clearly elected leadership) that chose to be associated with the efforts. Both Catholic and non-Catholic, these entities represent the broad reach of the Franciscan message. They are congregations and provinces of religious men and religious women, Secular Franciscan regions, and ecumenical partners, building upon Francis' spirit of crossing "borders" to join in the common invitation of God to transform the world.

How does FAN function?

FAN is composed of three interrelated parts, each inspiring and supporting the others in a relational Franciscan style:

- FAN members: Friars, sisters, Secular Franciscans, ecumenical Franciscans, and the men and women with whom they minister. FAN membership is attained through the leadership entity being a part of it. FAN members will seek to animate the grassroots of their ministries and places of service to be advocates of transformation. At the same time, by nature of the relationships of service to persons who are poor or marginalized, the members have a unique and privileged perspective to share in voicing the change we seek.
- National Leadership Commission: A representative body of the Franciscan family in the United States, the Commission serves as a recognized group of leaders who will work to help the larger FAN formulate and focus the issues of advocacy for transformation, as well as to enhance the network's communication conduits.
- Action Center: Based in Washington, D.C., with staff trained and dedicated to help the FAN
 achieve its social-transformation goals. The center's staff will monitor and advise the course
 of the network's strategic decisions and will work with the members and the FAN
 Leadership Commission to help them develop the skills for greater public-advocacy
 impact.

How is FAN supported?

In its inaugural year, member communities will make donations to support the FAN. In the future, additional means will be sought as the FAN grows and becomes ever more effective.

FAN goals for 2007-2008:

- Establish and begin the network with an operating Leadership Commission and Action Center.
- o Finalize the guidelines and process for choosing issues and responses for transformative action.
- Host a kick-off gathering for advocacy in spring 2008
- o Define public plans for training and building the FAN in 2008-2009.

FAN unity statement:

We Franciscan brothers and sisters, Religious and Secular, from throughout the United States gathered together in Baltimore, Md., to discern the possibility of a unified Franciscan voice for justice. With great concern for dehumanizing issues in our society, we recognized trends contrary to our calling as followers of Christ. We see that we have the power to effectively advocate for the redistribution of resources, the responsible care for creation, and the healing of relationships within the Franciscan family, the Church, and society. To these ends, we commit ourselves and call all members of the family to speak with one Franciscan voice to effect the transformation of national social policy. By walking with our brothers and sisters who are poor and marginalized, we intend to advocate for peace and to reaffirm the dignity of all creation.

Regional Executive Council—Commissions Gatherings

April 21–22, Ridgecrest, N.C.

Summary:

- Review of fair-share payments sent by local fraternities. Jerry Rousseau, regional treasurer, planned to send letters to fraternities explaining what Fair Share means by referencing SFO Rule and General Constitutions.
- Judy Haupt, regional minister, reviewed the Annual Report summary. Presently, 35 members in the region have "excused" status.
- Betti Longinotti, Youth/Young Adult Commission chair, reported that Kevin Eldris, 18, requested a scholarship for the Youth Congress at the Quinquennial in Pittsburgh in July. The council agreed to award him a \$500 scholarship. Betti also said she had two youth signed up

for the St. Francis Inn trip in June to Philadelphia. Additionally, she announced the World Youth Day 2008 registration begins in July. She estimates that the cost per attendee will be about \$3,000. Money will have to be raised for anyone who will attend.

- Cathy Arcand, Work Commission chair, asked that members of the region send her stories about how they bring their Franciscan charism to their workplace.
- Plans reviewed for the Annual Regional Gathering, to be held at Ridgecrest Conference Center, Aug. 10–12. Theme will focus on St. Elizabeth of Hungary.
- Judy summarized the process for the regional election and the list of nominees.
- Because of the death of Glenn Berns, Area 1 councilor, a person was needed to fill that position until the regional election in August. Judy had asked Faye Martin, minister of Channel of Peace Fraternity, Chattanooga, and Faye agreed to fill the position and reported that Faye agreed. The council voted unanimously to approve Judy's recommendation.

June 9–10, Chattanooga, Tenn.

Summary:

- Ratified decision to canonically establish Franciscan Martyrs of Siroki Brijeg Emerging Community; establishment scheduled for ARG.
- Jerry Rousseau submitted proposed 2008 budget (see budget on p.); Regional Fraternity Council will vote on budget at ARG.
- Judy submitted proposal for new area structure; REC approved structure (see p. 5).
- Audrey Binet proposed amendment to regional guidelines to affirm that those who have been admitted to the Secular Franciscan Order by the Rite of Admission can have SFO after their names; if a candidate doesn't profess, the SFO designation ceases to exist. REC approved.
- REC agreed that nomination for Regional Executive Council will be accepted up to and including start of ARG (see nomination form, p. 16). **T**




