On path to sainthood

"These few words are being set down here as they come from my mind and my heart. And if I must write them with my hands in chains, I find that much better than if my will were in chains."

Franz Jagerstatter, writing from prison

Franz Jagerstatter is a model for all Franciscans—secular and vowed religious—that conscience formed in Scripture and strengthened by the sacraments holds sway over orders from earthly kingdoms.

The Church will beatify him on Oct. 26 in Linz, Austria.

Born in Linz on May 20, 1907, Franz was

the illegitimate son of two young servants who could not afford to marry.

The father supported Franz's mother, but was killed in World War I. Later the mother married a farmer named Jagerstatter, who adopted Franz. He grew up in the Austrian village of St. Radegund.


Wild and rebellious during his adolescence and early adulthood, Franz belonged to a "gang" who drank heavily and fought rival gangs from other villages. He was a natural leader even then. In some ways his youth resembles that of St. Francis.

Franz experienced a religious conversion in 1934 while working in the Stienmark iron mines. He attended Mass frequently and found himself drawn to deep prayer and reading of Scripture. When Franz returned to St. Radegund, the villagers who had known him during his wild days were astonished at his conversion.

In 1936 Franz married a prayerful and devout woman named Franziska. They had three daughters: Maria, Aliosa, and Rosalia.

Soon after his marriage he became a member of the Third Order of St. Francis and was an See FRANZ, page 5

What are we called to do?

The answer is in the Rule, General Constitutions, National Statutes, and Regional Guidelines.

From SFO Rule, Article 21:

On various levels, each fraternity is animated and guided by a council and minister (or president) who are elected by the professed according to the constitutions.

Their service, which lasts for a definite period, is marked by a ready and willing spirit and is a duty of responsibility to each member and to the community.

General Constitutions

Article 31.2:

The office of minister or councilor is a fraternal service, a commitment to hold oneself available and responsible in relation to each brother and sister and to the fraternity so that each one will realize his or her own vocation and each fraternity will be a true community, ecclesial and Franciscan, actively present in the Church and in society.

Article 32.1

The ministers and councilors should live and foster the spirit and reality of communion among the brothers and sisters, among the various fraternities, and between them and the Franciscan family. They should, above all, cherish peace and reconciliation in and around the fraternity.

Article 33.2

The councils of higher levels should not do what can be adequately carried out either by the local fraternities or by a council of a lower level. They should respect and promote their vitality so that they fulfill their duties properly. The local fraternities and councils concerned should commit themselves to carry out the decisions of the international council and of the other councils of higher levels, and to implement their programs, adapting them when necessary to their own situation.

Guidelines of the Brothers and Sisters of Saint Francis Regional Fraternity

Article 4. Regional Executive Council

Section 3. The Regional Executive Council has the following duties:

a. To exercise a prophetic role that challenges the members of the regional fraternity to new areas of growth in their Franciscan, ecclesial, and apostolic commitments.

- b. To build relationships with local fraternities and groups by providing consistent informed guidance, leadership and encouragement.
- c. To foster cooperation and communion among the local fraternities and groups.
- d. To propose recommendations to the Regional Fraternity Council and to implement the approved recommendations.
- e. To foster relationships with other branches of the Franciscan family.
- f. To make the charism of our Seraphic Father present in the life and mission of the Church.
- g. To promote lifelong commitment and knowledge of the Franciscan way of life.
- h. To represent Secular Franciscans and promote mutual relationships with other church or civic organizations.
- i. To follow the directives of the "Process for Establishing a New Fraternity" in the *Handbook for Spiritual Assistance to the Secular Franciscan Order* when giving guidance to those wishing to establish a new fraternity.
- j. To obtain a facility, schedule a date, and plan the schedule for the Annual Regional Gathering.
- k. To appoint or reappoint the commission coordinator(s) and the commission chairs every three years.
- 1. To appoint or reappoint an editor for Communio, the regional newsletter, every three years.
- m. To make sure the treasurer is maintaining adequate records and discharging the duties of the office in a Franciscan manner. [cf. 2003 Treasury Guidelines, General 3]
- n. To periodically review these Regional Guidelines.

Our call and duty is to serve.

Our region is growing rapidly.

People are drawn to follow our Franciscan way of life by your example.

Be grounded in your Franciscan spirituality to live the Gospel in the footsteps of St. Francis and St. Clare.

Follow our Rule and incorporate the Constitutions into your journey.

Use the 12 elements of our Franciscan spirituality and the Four Pillars for reinforcement. We are ever so grateful to Fr. Linus DeSantis, OFM Conv., our regional spiritual assistant, who with Audrey Binet, SFO, regional minister1998-2004, and past councils prepared these tools. Refer to them regularly.

We will walk together in our Franciscan journey and take up the challenges each day. Remember the words of St. Francis when he lay dying: "My brothers [and sisters] we must begin now to do something. Up to now we have done very little."

Editor's Journal

This Communio has articles about Franz Jagerstatter and the Franciscan Martyrs of Siroki Brijeg. They all chose the real peace of living and dying for their faith, rather than the false peace of capitulating to the demands of the opposition—and, in Jagerstatter's case, his own community's advice.

Just the other day Jennye Taylor Johnson, SFO, our regional Peace and Justice Commission chair, sent out the news that Father Louis Vitale, OFM, and Father Steve Kelly, SJ, were sentenced Oct. 17 "to five months in federal

prison for nonviolent action they engaged in last year at Ft. Huachuca, Arizona. Training in torture techniques have been documented at this US Army base."

The report continues: "The case stems from a November 19, 2006, witness against torture that the two priests engaged in at the southern Arizona army base. The two attempted to speak with enlisted personnel and deliver a letter denouncing torture and the Military Commissions Act of 2006 to Maj. Gen. Barbara Fast, commander at Fort Huachuca, who had headed the Abu Ghraib prison when revelations on torture at the facility broke."

In their statement, Fathers Vitale and Kelly said, "We tried to put the evidence of torture on full and honest display in the courthouse and were denied. We were prepared to put on evidence about the widespread use of torture and human rights abuses committed during interrogations at Abu Ghraib and Guantanamo in Iraq and Afghanistan

"This evidence was gathered by the military itself and by governmental and human rights investigations. Because the court will not allow the truth of torture to be a part of our trial, we plead no contest."

In June, as a correspondent for The Catholic News & Herald (CNH), the Diocese of Charlotte, N.C.'s, newspaper, I covered "The Nonviolence of Jesus: Living the Gospel Today." Representatives of the Pax Christi chapter from Murphy and Hayesville, N.C., spoke at the conference and included just-war criteria:

Before the war begins, there must be:

- Just Cause—only use force to correct a grave evil; that is, aggression or massive violation of the basic rights of entire populations;
- Comparative Justice—injustice suffered by one party must significantly outweigh that suffered by the other;
- Legitimate Authority—duly constituted public authorities;

- Right Intention—force may be used only in a truly just cause and solely for that purpose;
- Probability of Success—arms may not be used in a futile cause or where disproportionate measures are required to ensure success;
- Proportionality—overall destruction expected from the use of force must be outweighed by the good to be achieved;
- Last Resort—only after all peaceful alternatives have been used.

During the conflict, there must be:

- Noncombatant Immunity—not the object of direct action, must take steps to minimize indirect harm;
- Proportionality—Use no more force than is necessary to achieve military objectives;
- Right Intention—even amid conflict politicians and military leaders must strive for peace with justice.

After the war, there must be:

- Just Termination—negotiate conditional surrender;
- Restitution—victor must repair damage done.

Is the Iraq war just?

Not according to "War and Occupation in Iraq," a report that the Global Policy Forum published in June.

The GPF "monitors policy making at the United Nations, promotes accountability of global decisions, educates and mobilizes for global citizen participation, and advocates on vital issues of international peace and justice."

I highly recommend this report (www.globalpolicy.org and click on "War and Occupation in Iraq").

Along with other Franciscans around the country, we fasted and prayed for peace on Oct. 3 and 8 (see page 10 to learn what some of our fraternities did). If you need encouragement to keep on fasting, this report will give it to you.

active participant in the village parish, working as a church sexton whenever he was not farming the family fields. His daily life included fasting until noon, celebrating Eucharist and, although he and his wife were not well-to-do, he gave generously to the poor.

He began to earn a reputation as a fanatic. The villagers who had denounced his wild youth now denounced his conversion to Gospel living. Again you could draw a parallel with the life of Francis.

In 1938, when the German annexation of Austria commenced, Franz openly opposed the takeover and the ideology of National Socialism, which he described as a "shining train going to hell." His conscience told him it was impossible to be allegiant to the Nazi Party and a faithful Catholic Christian at the same time.

Following the annexation, for which his was the sole dissenting vote in his village, Franz openly denounced Adolph Hitler and even refused Nazi government cash allotments offered to each family. When a severe hailstorm destroyed most of his crops, he would not accept Nazi emergency subsidies.

Franz was drafted in 1940 and reported for six months training in the motor corps. He returned home vowing to refuse military conscription in the future.

He sought advice of family, friends, a priest, and a bishop. They all advised him to join the military when called, because his family needed him and refusal meant execution. Against all that advice Franz became a conscientious objector. He said he would rather his children have a father martyred for following Christ than a Nazi for a father.

On March 1, 1943, Franz presented himself to the military and stated that under no circumstances would he fight and kill. He offered to serve as a medical orderly as a work of mercy but refused to advance the Nazi cause in the war. He was imprisoned in Linz, Austria, before being transferred to



Berlin, where he stood trial on July 6, 1943, and was sentenced to death for sedition. The courts never responded to his offer to work as a medic.

On Aug. 9, 1943, a year to the day after St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein) was gassed at Auschwitz, Franz was taken to the Nazi Brandenburg-Havel facility; he was beheaded at 4 p.m., lying on his back, facing the guillotine. He had written that he "could change nothing in world affairs" but that at the very least he might "be a sign that not everyone let themselves be carried away with the tides."

REFLECTION

Franz wrote from prison: "Just as a man who thinks only of this world does everything possible to make life here easier and better, so must we, too, who believe in the eternal Kingdom, risk everything in order to receive a great reward there. Our struggle is for the eternal Kingdom ... we need no rifles or pistols for our battle, but, instead, spiritual weapons — and foremost among them is prayer. For prayer, as St. Clare says, is the shield, which the flaming arrows of the Evil One cannot pierce."

Father Jochmann, the prison chaplain stated, "To the end of his days Franz' eyes

shone with joy and confidence, his face full of peace."

He later told some Austrian nuns, "The military beheaded a great man today. He lived as a saint and has now died a hero. I feel with certainty that this simple man is the only saint that I have ever met in my lifetime."

A few kilometers north of St. Radegund is the birthplace of Adolph Hitler. Somewhat further on lies Linz, the provincial capital and childhood home of Adolph Eichmann.

Is it coincidence that these three men are native to the same general locality: one, the dictator who terrorized the civilized world and was responsible for the genocide of millions of human beings in extermination camps and wars; one, his willing servant and collaborator in the infamous "Final Solution"; the third, a simple peasant armed with nothing more than the vision of a shining train and an unshakeable faith in the weapons of the Spirit, who chose death rather than play "their crooked game."

They are all dead now, but it is the peasant whose witness lives on as a source of inspiration to others who find themselves facing situations with even greater potential for evil—including the possible annihilation of the world itself.

There are no memorials to Hitler or Eichmann, but the tiny church of St. Radegund, where Franz's ashes are buried, has become a place of pilgrimage because martyrs live, while dictators die.

ACTION

Beatification isn't for Franz, who is alive with God and has no need for our recognition; it is for us. We need him as an example of a Secular Franciscan Catholic to whom we can pray for guidance in matters of conscience.

Hitler was only able to oversee the Holocaust because ordinary people, most of whom were Christian, obeyed Hitler rather than God. Franz Jagerstatter's witness reminds us of our duty of noncooperation with evil and of conscientious objection's

crucial role in the lives of the faithful. This is one more indication that peacemaking is no marginal vocation for Catholics, especially Franciscan Catholics.

Prayer for the canonization of Franz Jagerstatter

Lord Jesus Christ, you filled your servant Franz Jagerstatter with a deep love for you, his family, and all people. During a time of contempt for God and humankind you bestowed on him unerring discernment and integrity. In faith, he followed his conscience, and said a decisive NO to National Socialism (Nazism) and unjust war. Thus, he sacrificed his life. We pray that you may glorify your servant Franz so that he may encourage many people to grow in love for you and all people. May his example shine out in our time, and may you grant all people the strength to stand up for justice, peace, and human dignity. For yours is the glory and honor with the Father and the Holy Spirit now and forever. Amen.



Being the messengers

One of the elements that I love about the ARG is the abundance of Franciscan joy.

Everyone left filled with joy and hope. It would be easy, as Kathy Taormina, NAFRA Youth/Young Adult Commission chair, said, to become retreat junkies—unless we seize such grace-filled experiences to internalize, embrace, and increase our joyful spirit.

In the book, *Praying with Francis of Assisi*, there is a story about Franciscan joy: "The image of his companions traveling through the towns and countrysides of Italy, singing and bursting with unrestrained joy, was surely a common one. Francis found joy in the message of the Gospel. As is always true with joy, his became contagious. Since his time, 'Franciscan joy' has become an identifying mark of Francis and those who share his spirit."

We may mistakenly think that joy is only a happy feeling. Father Benet Fonck, OFM, points out, in *Called to Follow Christ*, that Francis' story reminds us that perfect joy is the "conquering of oneself and willingly enduring sufferings, insults, humiliations, and hardships for the love of Christ."

Jesus certainly wasn't happy in the Garden of Gethsemane. You'll recall that he experienced such a sharp and bitter attack of sadness, grief, fear, and weariness that he immediately uttered, "My soul is sad unto death."

Jesus had asked the apostles to stay awake and pray with him, but each time he returned to them he found them asleep.

intent on betraying the Lord: "For very many are sleepy and apathetic in sowing virtues among the people and maintaining the truth, while the enemies of Christ in order to sow vices and uproot the faith are wide awake—so much wiser are the sons of darkness in their generation than the sons of light" (Gospel of Mark, Navarre Bible).

We must stay awake and intent in sowing joy and hope among our brothers and sisters. May we always be mindful to "rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul" (Isaiah 61:10).

Youth spend inn weekend

They were Matthew Hair, 18, Hendersonville, N.C.; Kylee Thrash, 17, and Amber Congdon, 16, Richmond Hill, Ga.; Tricia Flanery, 16, Katie Longinotti, 21, and Bob Longinotti, Winston-Salem, N.C.; Allie Dedmon, 16, and Vickie Evans, 16, Shelby, N.C.; Mary Kate Ferry, 26, Greensboro, N.C.; Anthony Perlas, 17, Greenville, S.C.; Franciscan Youth volunteers Renee Willey, St. Bonaventure University grad; Jay Verzosa, Loyola University grad; and me.

Considering the distance that Kylee and Amber traveled from Georgia, the trip was not only a mission trip but also a pilgrimage.

Most of the participants did not know each other before our travel but quickly became a community working side by side at St. Francis Inn and lodging together at the inn's Volunteer House.

Although there was a modest cost per individual for our mission trip, we appreciated contributions from St. Maximilian Kolbe Fraternity in Charlotte and a parishioner from Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church.

We traveled in a 12-passenger van, Bob Longinotti being the designated driver.

Sisters of St. Francis, OFM friars, a layperson service team, and Franciscan young-adult volunteers giving a year or two of post-college service, work at the inn.

St. Francis Inn is a Franciscan community well rooted within Northeast Philadelphia's Kensington neighborhood to serve the homeless and indigent.

In addition to preparing and serving the meals on Saturday and Sunday, we had the opportunity to participate in the Morning Prayer and daily and Sunday Mass in the inn's chapel. The style and approach to these liturgies acquainted the participants with Franciscan spirituality.

We kept a journal as we traveled and experienced our mission trip. Mary Kate Ferry, a 26-year-old parishioner from St. Paul the Apostle Catholic Church, Greensboro, titled our journal, *The Soup Kitchen Chronicles*.

Matthew Hair, 18, son of Randy Hair, SFO, parishioners of Immaculate Conception Catholic Church, wrote that his experience at St. Francis Inn was powerful. The second day of the mission trip, he assisted in making deliveries to the poor and disadvantaged. Although he had experienced similar service opportunities in Hendersonville, he wrote that driving through the neighborhoods was overwhelming and a real eye-opener.

We Longinottis are parishioners at Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church in Winston-Salem. My daughter, Katie, has served in a soup kitchen before but encountered differences from the expectations she had prior to serving at the inn. She told of her experience of being able to personally interact with the guests and to befriend the friendless.

My hope as your Youth and Young Adult Commission chair for our regional fraternity is to see more interaction from our fraternities in advocating activities that the commission embraces.

From the standpoint of representing the Southeast and the age range invited to participate we were very successful! Many youth ministers from Southeast parishes inquired about the mission trip and the available spaces filled quickly. We had to turn away some applicants, which tells us there is a definite need we can serve in ministering to our youth and young adults, providing them apostolate service opportunities and nurturing their faith experiences. **T**

June 23

- **1.** Channel of Peace Fraternity hosted a potluck supper. Cricket Aull, regional vice minister, then led evening prayer.
- **2.** The council reviewed fair-share contributions. Any fraternities that had not yet made their contributions were to be contacted.

3. Area councilor reports:

- Area 1 Faye Martin, area councilor, reported that the Area 1 Retreat, June 1–3, had the most attendees ever, with 53 professed and candidates and seven inquirers. Her fraternity, Channel of Peace, had its Visitation on June 10. She interviewed candidates from the Newly Forming Group (NFG) in Knoxville for profession, scheduled for July 1.

6. Jerry Rousseau, regional treasurer, reviewed the 2008 budget.

A discussion was started on charity. Faye said that charity is usually the last item to be funded. Who were they?

Franciscan Martyrs of Siroki Brijeg Fraternity

Franciscan Martyrs of Siroki Brijeg Fraternity, Blairsville, Ga., received its canonical establishment on Aug. 11 at the Annual Regional Gathering.

The fraternity is named for the 30 Franciscan martyrs, aged 20–80, who died at their convent in Široki Brijeg (pronounced Breej), a village about an hour from Međugorje, in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

Franciscan friars of Herzegovenian origin arrived in Široki Brijeg in 1846, and began building Our Lady of the Assumption Church in September. Upon completion of the church, they built a convent, then a seminary, a library, and grammar school.

In his booklet, "Novena to the Široki Brijeg Martyrs," Father Jozo Zovko, OFM, tells us that in 1945 the friars knew they were in danger from communist partisans. The rector sent five young seminarians home.

Friar Viktor Kosir, 21, went home to Uzarici, 7 kilometers from Široki Brijeg, but remained only a few hours.

He told his family, "I cannot stay here at home. I must return to my fellow brothers."

When his family protested that they could hear the bombing in Široki Brijeg, Viktor replied, "It does not matter. I am going to share the same destiny because it is my community."

He was in the convent the next day, Feb. 7, 1945, when the partisans arrived.

"God is dead, there is no God, there is no pope, there is no Church, there is no need of you, you also go out in the world and work," they told the friars, many of whom were famous professors and authors.

The partisans told them to remove their habits.

"We are consecrated friars," they replied. "We cannot renounce our habits."

One angry soldier threw a crucifix to the floor, saying, "So there, now you can choose either life or death."

Father Zovko tells what happened next: "Each one of the friars knelt down, embraced and kissed Jesus; holding tightly the cross on their breast, each one of them said, as St. Francis did, 'You are my God and my All.' ... Some of them were very famous professors, they had written many books and handbooks for the school. But they didn't embrace their books....No, they embraced Jesus, the Master!

The partisans led the friars outside, one by one, shot them to death, and burned their bodies. "The friars met their fate praying and singing the 'Litany of Our Lady," Father Zovko continues.

One of the soldiers in the firing squad "was shocked by the heroic conduct of the friars." "Since I was a child, in my family I had always heard from my mother that God exists," the soldier said. "To the contrary, Stalin, Lenin, Tito had always asserted and taught each one of us: there is no God, God does not exist! But when I stood in front of the martyrs of Široki Brijeg and I saw how those friars faced death, praying and blessing their persecutors, asking God to forgive the faults of their executioners, it was then that I recalled to my mind the words of my mother and I thought that my mother was right: God exists!"

"Today," Father Zovko relates, "that soldier has converted and one of his sons has become a priest and a daughter is a nun."

He relates that Viktor Kosir's mother later gave birth to another son, whom she named Viktor. He later became a Franciscan friar.

The partisans also heavily damaged or destroyed the church, convent, seminary, and the library, including its 150,000 books.

All has been rebuilt. Every year, thousands of pilgrims visit the place where the friars died. Their bodies are now buried in the church.

The 30 Franciscan martyrs of Široki Brijeg are a powerful example of declaring oneself in the presence of others for Jesus. They lived something else Jesus also said in the Gospel, "Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell."

Pray for the members of the newly established fraternity of the Franciscan Martyrs of Siroki Brijeg that we have the courage to witness and follow the Gospel according to the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order. **T**

Spirit of Assisi feeds faith in Winston-Salem


A Franciscan presence has been developing here in our corner of North Carolina.

Since 2002, a core group of Franciscans (and lovers of Francis) have been meeting to discern the significance and implications of a Franciscan presence in North Carolina's Triad area.

This core team consisted of OFM Conventual friars, a Sister of St. Francis of Philadelphia, Secular Franciscans, and two individuals from the broader Catholic community.

Spending more than a year in prayer, faithsharing, and ongoing formation to develop a common understanding of a shared Franciscan identity, we expanded our Franciscan presence to include seven members from the larger Christian community.

This now-ecumenical group agreed to spend a year reflecting on *God's Fool*, Julien Green's biography of St. Francis, with the goal of creating a vision statement. This statement (see page 18)



describes who we are and who we desire to be as a Franciscan presence in Winston-Salem.

We've begun with a lunch-and-speaker series every Wednesday afternoon in the downtown Franciscan center in Our Lady of Fatima, the mission of Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church.

Starting Sept. 19, topics and speakers were "Centering Prayer," Father Joseph Madden, OFM Conv.; "Chi Kung Meditation as Prayer," clinical chaplain Beverly Isley-Landreth, M.Div., Th.M., CHTP; "Following in the Footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi," Joanne Jacovec, SFO; and "Assisi Decalogue: Interfaith Peacemaking," David Harold; "Christian Paradox," Jim Day, Oblate of St. Benedict.
