Minister/Formation Director workshops set for 2009





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### Minister's Message

Our promise at profession is to follow the Gospel according to the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order. Each of us says, "I promise to live all the days of my life the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Secular Franciscan Order by observing its rule of life."

What a commitment!

Sometimes I wonder what I must *do* to live this promise. But I forget that SFO is not something we *do*. Rather, it is who we *are* and how we live each moment of our lives.

How can I *be* a Secular Franciscan and witness to the life and teaching of our Lord, Jesus Christ?

The Gospel speaks to each of us individually as if Christ were speaking directly to us, if we listen with our heart. Read and reflect. Use *lectio divina* 

to find your message.

Read the Rule. Make it part of who you are. Fr. Kevin Queally, TOR, has suggested that we read and reflect on one article of the rule each day. An easy way is to read Article 1 on the first day of the month and continue for 26 days. On day 27, and for the next few days, rest and reflect. Then, on the last day of the month, read the Prologue. Begin again with Article 1 the next day.

At our annual gathering Cricket Aull, SFO, gave us these suggestions to find holiness:

- 1. Find Christ in every person.
- 2. Find gratitude in your heart.
- 3. Find a way to impart peace.
- 4. Find the kingdom of God.
- 5. Find a way to grow in holiness.

"May whoever observes all this be filled in heaven with the blessing of the most high Father, and on earth with that of his beloved Son, together with the Holy Spirit, the Comforter." (Blessing of St. Francis from the Testament)

Celebrate being a Secular Franciscan.

# From BSSF to NAFRA: Region's response to CIOFS questions

Our minister general, Encarnación del Pozo, SFO, asked us to contribute to the upcoming General Chapter in November. She asked for our prayers and our thoughts as they define objectives for the future of our Order.

We published the letter and questions in our March and June regional newsletter and asked that every professed member take time to pray about the items and reflect on the questions, first individually then as a community in local fraternity gatherings.

We then met at annual chapter in August to discuss and summarize our thoughts to submit our responses to our National Fraternity and International Council.

The summary response from Brothers and Sisters of St. Francis Region-61 is below.

We will continue to review all responses as we work to serve our region.

Please continue to pray for the success of both National and International Chapters scheduled for this fall.

Responses to Minister General from Brothers and Sisters of St. Francis Region

We are each called to follow this particular path in life. We are each unique yet similar as Secular Franciscans. We belong to a local fraternity, which is the basic unit and connected to our regional fraternity, national fraternity, and international community.

How would you describe you sense of belonging to the Secular Franciscan Order?

- 1. We have a sense of belonging to a spiritual family and to a real order. Our lay Order is unique in that it originated with its founder, St. Francis.
- 2. We feel like we are part of a worldwide family, different yet sharing the same spirit.
- 3. We pray together and serve together. We are encouraged to be our own unique selves. Our fraternities give us support and encouragement; they help us to grow in holiness.
- 4. We bring our whole selves to our fraternity meetings; we are open about our weaknesses and difficulties, and thus receive love, healing, and support from others.
- 5. Our sense of belonging is in direct proportion to involvement in local fraternity and region activities (retreats, gatherings, workshops, apostolates).
- 6. Our sense of belonging is developed through our interconnectedness with greater network of the Franciscan family (all three Orders) a worldwide "family."
- 7. Being a Secular Franciscan challenges me to follow the Gospel in daily life.

Where do we go from here, defining objectives for the next six years?

- 1. We would like to promote more collaboration from the first and second orders. We want to work with the first order but not be controlled by them.
- 2. A greater focus on the universal issues that were important to Francis and that still need to be addressed today such as: care of creation, preferential option for the poor, and See CIOFS, page 5

- 3. We would like the Order worldwide to focus on one issue, such as hunger or water, to adopt as a project to make a difference and work together for common goals.
- 4. We must be grounded in our Franciscan identity and promote visibility. Wear Tau.
- 5. Promote greater involvement with youth to attract younger people to discover a vocation to SFO.
- 6. Promote creative study of the Rule help each other to live each article as part of who
- 7. Create new ways to share Francis' message with those who are not members of the Franciscan family.
- **8.** Develop worldwide directory and use it as a tool for prayer and visitation.
- 9. Consider a new formulation of what the Secular Franciscan Order is as well as what constitutes authentic Franciscan spirituality for inquirers.
- 10. Open and frequent communication between fraternities, local, national and international. Use of Web sites. T

# What the SFO means to me

Whenever I think about what the SFO means to me, I reflect back on what my life was like prior to getting involved with the SFO and what my life has become since my profession.

Prior to my two years of study and then my profession in 1999, I can honestly and without hesitation say that my life had very little prayerfulness and spirituality in it.

Even though I am a "cradle Catholic" my involvement with my church consisted of going to Mass on Sunday, occasionally participating in the sacrament of reconciliation, being present at Mass on those holy days of obligation during the year, and maybe being just a little more focused during the Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter seasons.

I spent very little time praying, even less time reading religious books, and even less time reflecting on just where I was headed with my spiritual life. I have absolutely no reservation in saying that this all greatly changed once I became involved in the SFO. And I need to stop here and say that if it were not for my wife, Faye, I don't know if I



would have ever become involved with the SFO.

It was some time in the early fall of 1997 that Faye went to an SFO information meeting. I did not go with her. Being a "redblooded sports-loving member of the male gender," I was at home that Sunday afternoon watching pro football. I didn't have time for any information meeting.

When Faye got home, she was very

enthused about what she had learned and said she would really like for me to go with her to the next meeting. I'm sure I mumbled something to the effect that I would think about it, and I don't believe I gave it another thought.

However, when the day arrived for the next meeting, Faye reminded me that I had said I would go with her.

I dragged myself to the car, and we rode over to St. Jude where the meeting was to be held. But, I'm sure my mind was more concerned with the football I was missing. Still, I had promised to go with her, so I thought to myself, "I'll go, get this over with, and then get back home to catch up on the NFL games."

Boy, was I wrong!

I became very interested in the SFO, began the study process, learned a great deal about St. Francis and St. Clare and, before I knew it, I was standing with Faye at the steps to the altar at St. Jude on Aug. 15, 1999, making our profession into this most wonderful gift which the good Lord has given to me through Faye's intercession.

I had an almost immediate transformation in my lifestyle; at least it seemed to me that I did. Many of the things that had been so important to me—my job, advancement in my job, getting recognized for things at work, watching any sport that was on TV, playing golf—well, you get the picture. All of these became secondary.

I began to realize that what really mattered was where I was headed spiritually and what I was doing for my church. Over the past nine years, I have become a much more docile person when it comes to those things that used to be so important.

I have become much more interested in my church and my prayer life and where I want to go insofar as my future is concerned.

I know that it is up to me to work toward my eternal salvation. I know I have an allforgiving God who knows what a weak human being I am, but he is always forgiving and always welcomes me back. In the past few years it has become crystal clear that nothing I have accomplished or nothing I have has been a result of anything I have done—they are all gifts to me from God. He is allowing me to enjoy them while I continue my journey here on his earth.

He is so totally generous in what he continues to give to me, and it has taken me more than 60 years to realize that this is the way it has always been in my life.

Another beautiful result of my being in the SFO is the fact that I now want to begin every day spending time praying, thanking God for all he gives me and for all he lets me do but also asking him to continue to provide for me.

I so look forward every morning to spending the first two hours beginning with saying the beautiful Franciscan Crown rosary, reading my daily readings from *Christian Prayer: The Liturgy of the Hours*, and concluding with a series of petitions for individuals in need of prayer—my family and Faye's family, the pope, bishops, priests, religious, deceased family and friends, and prayers to special saints who have become such an important part of my life.

Each evening I also try to do similar prayers in thanksgiving for God getting me through another day.

I also find myself wanting to attend Mass on days other than Sunday whenever I have the chance.

This very special gift which Jesus gave to us on Holy Thursday night has also become so much more meaningful to me. When I now attend a weekday Mass, I find myself so overwhelmed at what Jesus did for all of mankind when he came to earth and eventually died the horribly torturous death on the cross for our salvation.

During the past nine years such incredible changes have taken place in my life and the key ingredient to these changes is the SFO. I will always be so grateful to my wife, Faye, for serving as God's intermediary in my being introduced to the SFO. **T**

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## "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"

In a letter to Br. Leo, St. Francis writes, "In whatever way it seems best to please the Lord God and to follow His footprints and His poverty, do this with the blessing of God and my obedience. And if you believe it necessary for the well-being of your soul, or to find comfort, and you wish to come to me, Leo, come!"

In Swimming in the Sun: Discovering the Lord's Prayer With Francis of Assisi and Thomas Merton, Fr. Albert Haase, OFM, uses this writing as a foundation for discernment. I would like to share what I learned from his insight.

He writes that some mistakenly think that discernment is a "predetermined, preordained decision from on high which I must struggle to figure out and then buckle under to obey." Instead, Fr. Haase states that we are to collaborate with God and seek to find what is ours to do that would please God and allow us "to participate dynamically and creatively in helping build the Kingdom of God."

He calls this method, "head-heart decision making" and lists "five factors that need to be taken into consideration to maintain the delicate balance between the head and heart" in the discernment process.

- 1. *Our past history* includes everything about the values that we were brought up with, the dynamics of our family, our intellectual ability and education, and so forth. Our past can "narrow our possibilities or options."
- 2. *Our potential* includes our natural and possibly latent talents and abilities. These are our "wild cards" and can help "unlock our future."
- 3. *Our present identity* includes our "present commitment to others as well as the responsibilities which such commitments place upon us that need to be respected."
- 4. *Our hopes, dreams, and desires* are those "yearnings of the heart" that add "passion, ambition, energy, and meaning" to our life.
- 5. *Our free heart* means our heart must be freed from the "false self's agenda. ... Only after Francis freed himself from the false self's agenda to be a famous knight could he truly follow his heart in serving the Master."

Discernment "demands honest self-knowledge and should always be done in a communal setting: with family and friends, those affected by one's decision, and one's spiritual director in dialogue with the Scriptures and Church."

"To please God is simply to discover one's own unique way of contributing to Jesus' Kingdom of peace, justice, and love," Fr. Haase writes. "It is what we pray when we pray, 'Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven'"



The logo for the 12th General Chapter contains important references:

- In the center, two hands are joined together holding a rose in sign of prayer, a symbol of the unity, humility, and the "perfume" of our profession and belonging to the SFO, and at the same time a reminder of St. Elizabeth, our patron saint;
- Surrounding the hands are three concentric circles which symbolize the Franciscan Family; i.e., the three Orders founded by Saint Francis of Assisi;
- Alongside the hands are six parallel horizontal lines which form a stairway that symbolizes the six priorities of the SFO (Formation, Presence in the World, Franciscan Youth, Finances, Spiritual Assistance, Communion in the Franciscan Family);
- All this, summarized in the Tau, is found in the heart of the Church, which is represented by the 12 columns forming an arch over the other symbols, a reminder of its presence in the world.
