Visiting Greccio, Site of First Recreation of Mystery of Incarnation by Francis of Assisi

As a member of the International Board of Directors (IBD) of the non-governmental organization Franciscans International, I was blessed to attend arecent board meeting in Assisi, Italy. Franciscans International is the voice at the United Nations on issues of human rights, environmental justice and peacebuilding.

As the IBD, we decided to have our meeting in the place where the Franciscan movement began.

We also decided to add on a pilgrimage at the end of the meetings and have the staff of our Geneva, Switzerland and New York City offices join us. As I was on the

planning committee for the places we were to journey to, and knowing it was the 800th anniversary of St. Francis creating the first Christmas crèche, we also had to go to Greccio.

Greccio is the most popular sanctuary in the Rieti Valley. The word crèche comes from the name of this town, adapted into English through the French.

This event was considered so important in Francis' life that Thomas of Celano made it a turning point in his biography of Francis. From Friar Thomas we read, "Francis used to recall with regular meditation the words of Christ and recollect His deeds with most attentive perception. Indeed, so thoroughly did the humility of the Incarnation and the charity of the Passion occupy his memory that he scarcely wanted to think of anything else." No one else in history had the foresight or presence of mind to recreate the mystery of the Incarnation in human dimensions. Francis felt the call to do so. He created the possibility of entering into that visual representation of the birth of our Savior; using live animals, hay and a manger. Before long, a church would be erected on the site where the Greccio nativity scene took place.

As the FI pilgrims traveled to Greccio from Assisi, it was a cold and rainy day. We were able to have some background on Greccio by Friar Domenico, the guardian of the community there. He also took us to see the old library where the early friars were encouraged to study, and we passed one of the dormitories once occupied by St.

Bonaventure. We were also able to have Christmas Mass in the grotto and visit the church and the gift shop. Although it was a rainy day, it still held the mystical feeling as it must have 800 years ago.

I traveled to Greccio for the first time in 2009 and I must say, I did not feel much difference. With the exception that I am older in my Franciscan journey, the experience was still as fresh and meaningful as it was all those years ago. The only noticeable difference was it took me longer to get up all those steps to the top!

As I prayed for our Franciscan family, I felt the grace of the Holy Spirit and the presence of our Seraphic Father Francis in that wonderfully sacred space. And as we celebrate the 800th anniversary of that first Christmas scene, we also celebrate the spirit of Francis as he made present the


Accident, reflection closes chapter for regional spiritual assistant

Good brothers and sisters in Christ, May the Lord grant you His peace!

While driving home from a visitation this year, I was involved in a terrible vehicle accident that totaled my truck and put me in the hospital and inpatient rehabilitation for a month.

When I arrived at the hospital, I was in shock and physicians said that I was near death. I attribute the prayers of my Franciscan brothers and



I chose to continue the diaconate ministry and resign as regional spiritual assistant.

Several factors weighed on my decision to retire as spiritual assistant. The principal considerations were travel, regional spiritual assistant duties, and my physical and mental capacities to perform the duties with quality. I will continue to support the region as spiritual assistant until the provincials appoint a replacement. However, I am limiting my driving to the Area 1 fraternities that are within a 3-hour drive. I offered to continue working with the spiritual assistant training program.

In discussions with our provincial spiritual assistant, Fr. Cid, I discovered that each bonded province is supposed to have its own regional spiritual assistant, which means that our region would have five regional spiritual assistants. Whether that is doable or not is the big question. With the shrinking population of members in the first orders, they may not be able to provide friars to the region. So, this will be a wait and see issue.

How does this affect you? Unless you are a minister, spiritual assistant or member of the regional executive committee, it doesn't impact you.

You and I have only one duty as professed members of the OFS, to live the gospel of Jesus Christ in accordance with the Rule of the SFO. How do we do that? First and foremost, we need to read and study the gospel. (Reminder: there are not four gospels, but only one and his name is Jesus Christ.) Further, we need to read and reflect on the Rule. Additionally, we need to be active participants in our order, especially at our local fraternity level. We made three promises when we were professed:

- 1. To embrace the gospel way of life following the example and words of St. Francis of Assisi, which are at the heart of our Rule.
- 2. To be faithful to this vocation and to **practice the spirit of service** proper to Secular Franciscans. (emphasis added)
- 3. To bind ourselves more closely to the Church and to work intently to rebuild the ecclesial community and fulfill its mission among all people.

In simple terms, we promised to live the gospel as Father Francis did, to practice service within the order and within our community, and to build up the Church to the best of our abilities.

At the end of Mass as deacon of the word, I send the community out with the words, "Go announce the Gospel of Jesus Christ." Occasionally, I modify it in a Franciscan "flavor", "By your actions, go announce the Gospel of Jesus Christ." I encourage you my brothers and sisters of the Franciscan family to announce the gospel by your actions.

As he finished it, he left quickly....By his action he taught them to consider themselves ashes, and that nothing else was close to his heart except what was in keeping with that view. We too are dust. Yet, the Light of the World has calls us to be his own.

Let us celebrate with Franciscans past and present who have professed to observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the example of Saint Francis of Assisi, who made Christ the inspiration and the center of his life with God and people. Multicultural Dates and Activities to Consider

As we move from spring into summer, I want to suggest some dates and events for further reflection and action by your local fraternities. Engaging with multiculturalism is something your fraternity can do regularly, exploring the rich racial and ethnic variety of our Church, our country, and our local communities.

By the time you get this newsletter, May 25 will probably have already passed. This date is the third anniversary of the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, MN, in 2020. As you will remember, Mr. Floyd was pinned to the ground by three police officers which caused him to asphyxiate. His death led to nationwide protests and revitalized the *Black Lives Matter* movement, which had started in response to the shooting death of Trayvon Martin in Florida in 2012.

While the slogan and movement *Black Lives Matter* is viewed as controversial by some people, it is worth remembering that it has nearly universal acceptance in the African-American community. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has provided some very useful resources explaining its meaning and history, and why it is in accord with Catholic teaching:

The best way to understand this, however, comes from a photography of Bishop Mark Seitz of El Paso, praying for George Floyd a few days after he was murdered.

This sad anniversary might be a good occasion for your fraternity to reflect on the ongoing legacy of racism in America. The bishops' pastoral, *Open Wide Our Hearts*, would make an excellent ongoing formation for your fraternity. I have also prepared a video of a talk on racism that can be used.

On a more positive note, 19 is Juneteenth, an important holiday for African-Americans to mark the end of slavery in the United States. If there is a Black Catholic community in your area, find out if they are going to celebrate Juneteenth and see if your fraternity can join them. Or simply attend mass at their church as a fraternity.

July 14 is the feast of St. Kateri Tekawitha, the only Native American saint in the United States. St. Kateri was a member of the Mohawk Nation from what is now upstate New York. Information about the *Lily of the Mohawks* can be found in an article from Franciscan Media:

Her feast day also provides a great opportunity to learn more about the Native American tribes who live in your area.

Finally, September 16 to October 15 is Hispanic Heritage Month, beginning on Mexican Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Central America are the most common. This month is a good opportunity to learn more about the Hispanic community in your area. Find out where they are from and what their special saints and devotions are. Everyone is familiar with Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patroness of Mexico, but there are many, many more, such as Our Lady of Providence, the Patroness of Puerto Rico.


Secular Franciscan from South Carolina Among Catholic Women of the Year

BSSF Regional Executive Council Recap

My how time flies! It seems like just yesterday that we were at ARG electing a new Regional Executive Council. Under the leadership of Ellen Ferrone, OFS, Regional Minister, your REC has been busy. We've had monthly ZOOM meetings and two in-person weekend meetings. We've also had three ZOOM meetings with REC and Fraternity ministers.

The highlights of those meetings include:

- With RFC approval, resolution of the surplus funds (\$21,000) in the Region's treasury.
 - Bishops in each of the eight Diocese represented in our region received a check or \$2000 to be given to Catholic Charities to provide services in the Diocese.
 - o Establishment of a grant program to support multi-fraternity retreats, \$5000.
- Preparations for August 2023 Annual Regional Gathering by both planning and logistics committees of REC members. Exciting updates will be provided soon.
- Given the dialog at the 2021 ARG meeting regarding travel time to Ridgecrest and the
 challenges for navigating the grounds, REC members conducted lengthy research and indepth discussion on the location for ARG 2024. This was presented to the REC via a
 ZOOM meeting. Based on feedback and continued discussion, it was determined that the
 only alternative may be a financial burden on our members. REC remains open to
 recommendations for future meetings.
- Our Regional Spiritual Assistant and area councilors have been busy conducting elections and visitations within the region.
- Our Vice Minister, Martha Roman, OFS, heads the Apostolate Grants Committee. Grants were awarded to two fraternities, Saint Clare in Winston Salem and Saints Francis and Clare in Knoxville, in support of their Apostolates. Grants were increased to \$300. Please continue to submit your requests.
- The Formation Director, Lynne Oeser, OFS and the JPIC Animator, Carolyn Townes,
 OFS, prepared Servant Leadership training to encourage more members of fraternities to
 become actively involved on local Councils. They have presented this to several
 fraternities, either by ZOOM or in person. They are also preparing for Formation
 Retreats. Please reach out to either Lynn or Carolyn for further information.
- Annual reports from each of the local fraternities were reviewed and the regional report was submitted to the National Fraternity.
- A multicultural survey was sent to each of the fraternities. Most fraternities returned the survey. Our Multicultural Chair, David Uribe-Cruz, OFS, has been busy reaching out to the local fraternities seeking involvement in enhancing outreach to diverse communities.
- Our Youth and Young Adult Chair, Bob Dorsch, OFS, continues to seek local fraternity volunteers to find new ways to engage youth and young adults. The Fraternity of St. Clare, under the leadership of their FY/YA liaison, arranged for a meal at Wake Forest

University. It was well received, and hopefully other fraternities will find ways to do similar activities.

- Our web site/Communio Editor, Sharon Winzeler, OFS, has been busy keeping the web site current as well as preparing the Fall 2022 and Winter 2023 editions of the Communio.
- One of our focus areas was to find ways to better serve the local fraternities. We look forward to more ZOOM meetings with the local ministers to discuss ways that we can all work together. REC plans to have ZOOM meetings with each of the newly elected Councils.
- Your Regional Treasurer, Zubair Simonson, OFS, and Regional Secretary, Mary Sacavage, OFS, along with all members of the REC are available to answer any questions or provide whatever assistance you may need. Mary also serves as the Regional database manager and can assist as needed.

We look forward to seeing everyone at the Annual Regional Gathering August 11-13, 2023.
